

One of America's most acclaimed composers, George Crumb (b. 1929) has been a leading voice in recent avant-garde music. His spiritual and esoteric projects—Crumb delves deeply into mystical philosophy—help keep him among the most frequently programmed living composers. Between 1972 and 1979 Crumb composed four volumes of piano music titled *Makrokosmos*.

Makrokosmos III, subtitled Music for a Summer Evening, is ensemble music for two amplified pianos and percussion. Commissioned by the Fromm Music Foundation, the set was premiered at Swarthmore College in 1974.

The final work in the set, *Music of the Starry Night*, opens with an epigraph from Austrian poet Rainer Maria von Rilke's haunting and ephemeral *Book of Images*:

And in the nights the heavy earth is falling from all the stars down into loneliness. We are all falling. And yet there is One who holds this falling endlessly gentle in His hands.

Dreams Offer Solace is based on a setting of Tara Wohlberg's inspirational poem that reiterates a message of the hopes and inspiration that are evoked through our dreams and visions. The rising melodic lines of this work are intertwined with a gorgeous oboe obligato, representative of dreams themselves.

The touching *Child of Song* by Norwegian composer Kim Andre Arnesen is dedicated to the memory of Grammy-award-wining choral composer Stephen Paulus, whose untimely death in 2014 shook the choral world. The lovingly offered text, a poem by Euan Tait, expresses the journey of art and specifically the music of Paulus, "No child of song falls into silence but into love's rest, seeded with re-awakening."

O Oriens is one of seven Magnificent Antiphons, a traditional series of texts in the Catholic and Lutheran churches sung at Vespers services for the last seven days of Advent. Each antiphon is a hymn to one of the attributes of Christ, as outlined in Scripture. Sung on December 21, the fifth-day antiphon O Oriens or O Morning Star, celebrates the qualities of eternal light and righteousness. Lukaszewsji's setting embraces both eight-part diatonic choral clusters as reminiscent of the rising of the morning star, as well as medieval melodic structures and parallelisms presenting the voice of humanity in prayer.

O Oriens, splendor lucis aeternae, et sol justitiae: veni, et illumina sedentes in tenebris, et umbra mortis.

O Morning Star, splendor of light eternal and sun of righteousness: Come and enlighten those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.

This is a powerful hymn written by Horatio Spafford after a tragic accident took the lives of his four daughters. The lyrics ("When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll; whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say, it is well, it is well with my soul") were set to a beautiful tune written by Bliss. In this piano solo arrangement by Steinberg, the arpeggios portray the waves and obstacles that we all face in our journey through life.

This world premiere for percussion trio was commissioned by the Office of International Programs and Staunton Music Festival.

Celestial Canons is a musical depiction of the fourth day of the biblical creation story, during which the sun, moon, and stars are created. The textures, moods, and narrative shape of the work are directly inspired by this astronomical imagery, and the instrumentation of the ensemble is constructed to allow for a wide variety of high and low timbres and color combinations. As the title might suggest, the piece is constructed from an intricately-woven tapestry of canonic melodies that journey across the three members of the ensemble.
