Program Texts and Translations Dreams of the Nutcracker

The Nutcracker is a two-act ballet, originally choreographed by Marius Petipa and Lev Ivanov with a score by Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (Op. 71). The libretto is adapted from E.T.A. Hoffmann's story, *The Nutcracker and the Mouse King*, by way of Alexander Dumas' adapted story, *The Nutcracker*. It was given its premiere at the Mariinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg on Sunday, December 18, 1892, on a double-bill with Tchaikovsky's opera, *Iolanta*.

Ernst Theodore Amadeus Hoffman wrote the original story of *The Nutcracker* in 1816. Although Hoffman's story was a fairy tale with characters like the Mouse Kind, it was not a tale for children! It was well-known French author Alexander Dumas who rewrote the work as a children's story, and in 1892, choreographer Marius Petipa asked Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky to write music for what was to become one of the most popular ballets in the world. Petipa gave Tchaikovsky extremely detailed instructions for the composition of each number, down to the tempo and number of bars. The completion of the work was interrupted for a short time when Tchaikovsky visited the United States for 25 days to conduct concerts for the opening of Carnegie Hall. Tchaikovsky composed parts of *The Nutcracker* in Rouen, France. Tchaikovsky's score has become one of his most famous compositions, in particular the pieces featured in the suite. Among other things, the score is noted for its use of the celesta, an instrument that the composer had already employed in his much lesser known symphonic ballad, *The Voyevoda*.

Although the original production was not deemed a success, the 20-minute suite that Tchaikovsky extracted from the ballet was. However, the complete *Nutcracker* has enjoyed enormous popularity since the late 1960s, and is now performed by countless ballet companies across North America, primarily during the Christmas season. We are delighted to present our version of the Ballet Suite, complete with narration by our JMU provost, Dr. Jerry Benson, and fanciful *Dreams of the Nutcracker*.
