Program Notes

Celebration Overture

Celebration Overture was commissioned by Edwin Franko Goldman for the American Bandmasters Association in 1955. It consists of three sections: fast, slow, and fast – like the Italian Baroque overture. In style it differs considerably from its ancestor. The overture emphasizes melodies that are short and highly rhythmic. The harmonies are sonorous, being added to the melody in parallel to provide color and depth. The result is a bright, festive work that fulfills the promise of the title.

Pageant

Pageant was completed for band in 1953 on a commission from Edwin Franko Goldman for the American Bandmasters Association. It was first performed under the composer's direction by the University of Miami Band. The works opens in a slow tempo with a motive in the horn that is used throughout both sections of the composition. This solemn chordal section is succeeded by a vivacious parade, introduced first by the snare drum. In the final portion of the piece, the two principal subjects are developed simultaneously to an inspired climax.

Four Scottish Dances

These dances were composed early in 1957, and are dedicated to the BBC Light Music Festival. They are all based on original melodies but one, the melody of which was composed by Robert Burns. The first dance is in the style of a slow strathspey - a slow Scottish dance in 4/4 meter - with many dotted notes, frequently in the inverted arrangement of the 'Scotch snap.' The name was derived from the strath valley of Spey. The second, a lively reel, begins in the key of E-flat and rises a semi-tone each time it is played until the bassoon plays it, at a greatly-reduced speed, in the key of G. The final statement of the dance is at the original speed in the home key of E-flat. The third dance is in the style of a Hebridean Song, and attempts to give an impression of the sea and mountain scenery on a calm summer's day in the Hebrides. The last dance is a lively fling, which makes a great deal of use of the open-string pitches of the violin (saxophones in the band edition).

Morning Alleluias for a Winter Solstice

Noted conductor Frederick Fennell, who commissioned this piece, wrote in the score, "*Morning Alleluias for The Winter Solstice* probably became the spirit as well as the title which Ron Nelson chose for this music when I told him of my personal experience in awakening one morning in a Hiroshima hotel room that was ablaze with brilliant morning sunlight. As I lay in bed with so many dark thoughts also crowding in on that morning's bright expectancies for the living day ahead,

I knew that these moments could only be celebrated as the triumph of the people of Hiroshima through the creation of a musical expression. The Hiroshima morning was in late November. Ron accepted my commission a few days later in Chicago. Other work was put aside so Ron could produce the score, which he signed on March 1, 1989." The work was premiered by the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra on May 14, 1989 with Fennell conducting.

Jug Blues and Fat Pickin'

Jug Blues and Fat Pickin' was written in 1986 and revised in 1990. Originally commissioned for the celebration of Tennessee's "Homecoming'86," it is without peer in the wind band repertoire. Inspired by recording of the Memphis Jug Band, the most recorded and perhaps most popular of the jug bands to spring up on Memphis' Beale Street in the late 1920's, and bluegrass banjo pickin', Freund's composition is a unique musical offering that melds "blues elements" with minimalist technique.

O Magnum Mysterium

O Magnum Mysterium is a responsorial chant from the Matins of Christmas (chants for the early part of the day). A number of composers have reworked the chant into a setting for their time. Byrd, Victoria, Gabrieli, Palestrina and Poulenc are just a few of the many notable composers who have completed settings of this chant. Morten Lauridsen (born February 27, 1943) is an American composer who received the National Medal of Arts in 2007. He was composer-in-residence of the Los Angeles Master Chorale from 1994–2001, and has been a professor of composition at the University of Southern California Thornton School of Music for more than 40 years. His works have been recorded on more than 200 CDs, five of which have received Grammy Award nominations, including Magnum Mysterium, which he arranged for the Los Angeles Master Chorale. This arrangement for wind band of Lauridsen's setting was completed in 2001 by H. Robert Reynolds.

"Profanation" from Jeremiah, Symphony No 1

Jeremiah, Bernstein's first symphony, was premiered in 1944. The text of the Jeremiah Symphony is from the Book of Lamentations. "Prophecy," the first movement, aims to parallel in feeling the intensity of the prophet's pleas for his people. "Lamentations," the third movement, observes the destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonians. "Profanation," the scherzo second movement, is based on the traditional Hebrew "Haftarah," a biblical selection from the Books of the Prophets read after the parashah in the Jewish synagogue service. The music depicts a general sense of destruction and chaos brought on by pagan corruption in ancient Jerusalem. The score is dedicated to Bernstein's father.
