Biographies

George Hirschmann joined the WHSV-TV weather team in June 2000 and has been the on-air meteorologist since October 2000 on the 5 pm, 6 pm and 11 pm newscasts. He graduated with a B.S. degree from LaSalle University and subsequently earned his Certificate in Broadcast Meteorology from Mississippi State University. Prior to attending Mississippi State, Hirschmann spent 25 years in the entertainment industry in Los Angeles in various capacities (you guess). Each day Hirschmann is responsible for analyzing weather data and presenting that information as related to the Shenandoah Valley in a factual and entertaining manner. He also represents WHSV and the weather in the community through public appearances, and on occasion, has produced his own onstage show. His favorite part of his job is interfacing with the public and "teaching them the highs and lows of the weather ... get it." Hirschmann is currently developing a meteorology course through James Madison University for the Lifelong Learning Institute. Hirschmann says he loves the weather: "studying it, delivering it, and explaining it, and in doing so, making the viewers feel like each and every weather day is a good day ... come rain or shine ... or possible showers ... or just a little hail after a hot spell ... or some isolated ..."

Rupen R. Shah, Chief Deputy
Commonwealth's Attorney for Augusta
County, was appointed by the Board
of Governors of the Virginia State Bar
Diversity Conference to serve and has
worked diligently to further the goals
of the Conference and to bring Jazz 4
Justice to the James Madison University
stage. He has served as president of the
Augusta County Bar Association and
was recognized by the Virginia State Bar
as the Local Bar Leader of the Year in
2009. He has also served as president of
Virginia State Bar's Diversity. Conference.
Shah has dedicated his career to

protecting children. He founded the Valley Children's Center, a nonprofit agency that helps children who are the victims of trauma and abuse. Shah worked tirelessly to eliminate all-day waits for juvenile court cases to be heard. He also organized "So You're 18" programs for 2,000 high school seniors in Staunton, Waynesboro and Augusta County to teach them the rights and responsibilities that come with adulthood.

Edward L. Weiner is president of the Virginia State Bar. Jazz 4 Justice was Ed's brainchild 14 years ago at George Mason University. It has received national and state awards of recognition. Ed is very pleased to have J4J make its fifth appearance on the stage of the Forbes Center.

Chuck Dotas is professor of music and coordinator of jazz studies at James Madison University, where he directs the JMU Jazz Ensemble. Dotas holds a B.M. from the University of Wisconsin at Green Bay, an M.M. from the Eastman School of Music and a D.A. from the University of Northern Colorado. He is well known as a composer and arranger, and his music is published through UNC Jazz Press, Walrus Music and Margun Music.

David A. Stringham, assistant professor of music at James Madison University, has taught music to students of all ages in public, private, university and community settings. His research interests include composition, improvisation, music technology and lifelong musicianship. Stringham frequently presents at conferences and professional meetings; his research appears in several peerreviewed journals. Stringham previously taught middle school and high school instrumental music in New York State, and holds degrees in music education from the Eastman School of Music (B.M. with highest distinction, M.M., Ph.D.).

Biographies (cont'd)

Dr. Andrew Connell performs in ensembles ranging from jazz to classical chamber music to Brazilian chorinho. He has performed with the Roanoke, Santa Cruz, Monterey (Calif.) and Toledo (Ohio) Symphonies, and has performed with a wide range of artists including Luciano Pavarotti, Dave Leibman, Lou Rawls, Mike Marshall and Jovino Santos Neto. Connell is also an ethnomusicologist whose primary research is in Brazilian popular instrumental music; he is currently a professor of music at JMU.

David Pope has an international reputation as a saxophonist, composer and author. He is a regular columnist in Saxophone Journal, and is a recognized authority on multiphonic techniques. He trained at the University of Massachusetts, Eastman School of Music and the University of Miami. Pope endorses the R.S. Berkeley "Virtuoso" saxophone and Applied Microphone Technology. His former students teach and perform across the country and in Europe.

Bob Hallahan has performed and taught jazz in a wide variety of venues and institutions throughout Virginia and the United States, and in Turkey, Russia and China, both as a featured soloist and with internationally recognized jazz artists such as Joe Henderson, Clark Terry, Freddie Hubbard, Sheila Jordan and Anita O'Day. In 2010, he joined the full-time faculty of the School of Music at James Madison University as an assistant professor of jazz.

Marlon Foster taught instrumental music for the Harrisonburg City Public Schools system at the middle school level for 26 years. He has conducted and adjudicated workshops involving concert percussion, marching percussion and jazz band rhythm sections throughout Virginia. He has conducted many city, county and All-District concert and jazz honor bands at the middle school level. He was a member of the United States Air Force Band at Langley Air Force Base under the direction of Lowell E. Graham. He has performed with the Shenandoah Valley Choral Society, Rockbridge Symphony, Harrisonburg/Rockingham Concert Band and the Shenandoah Valley Bach Festival Orchestra. He continues to perform jazz with many local and regional jazz ensembles. Foster received his B.M.Ed. and M.M. from James Madison University.

JMU Jazz Ensemble and Jazz Band

The JMU Jazz Ensemble and Jazz Band were founded in 1971; membership in each ensemble is determined via audition each semester. JMU jazz groups have performed at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts' Terrace Theater, Montreux International Jazz and Blues Festival, North Sea Jazz Festival and Virginia Music Educator's Association annual convention.

The JMU Jazz Ensemble has been featured with the U.S. Navy Commodores Jazz Ensemble and U.S. Air Force Airmen of Note Jazz Ensemble and at the East Coast Jazz Festival in Rockville, Maryland. The ensemble has performed with renowned artists like Bobby McFerrin and esteemed jazz vocalist Sheila Jordan.
