Billy Strayhorn (1915-1967)

Program Notes

William Thomas "Billy" Strayhorn (1915–1967) was one of the most accomplished composers in the history of American music, the creator of a body of work that includes many jazz standards. Yet all his adult life Strayhorn was overshadowed by his long-time employer, Duke Ellington. A musical prodigy who began his career as a pianist and composer while still a teenager in Pittsburgh, Strayhorn came to New York City at Ellington's invitation in 1939, remaining on the Ellington organization payroll for nearly three decades until Strayhorn's untimely death at age fifty-one. Strayhorn composed and arranged an astonishing amount of music for his employer: close to fifteen hundred autograph scores for the Ellington Orchestra in Strayhorn's hand survive, over five hundred of which were recorded by the Ellington Orchestra. Outside the Ellington organization, Strayhorn had an important, yet for the public eye largely hidden, musical life as a composer, arranger, and lyricist, writing for musical theater and in non-jazz genres.

In the Ellington organization, Strayhorn labored under a complex, unwritten agreement whereby Ellington thrived in the role of public artist to Strayhorn's private one, often taking the bows (and collecting the publishing royalties) for Strayhorn's work. Strayhorn was alternately relieved to be kept out of the limelight and frustrated about it. In Harlem, Paris, and New York City's downtown café society, the diminutive, soft-spoken African American composer carried himself with singular style and grace as one of the few mid-century jazzmen to be openly homosexual. His skill as a pianist and composer made him a hero to other musicians, but when he died in 1967, his life cut short by alcohol abuse and cancer, few people understood the vital role he played in the Ellington Orchestra's development into a vehicle for some of the most ambitious American music of the twentieth century.

This evening's concert would not be possible without the generous cooperation of Walter van de Leur, Professor of Jazz and Improvised Music at the University of Amsterdam, David Berger, and A. Alyce Claerbaut, President of Billy Strayhorn Songs, Inc. A wealth of information about Strayhorn's life and music can be found in two excellent texts (from which the above biographical information was excerpted): Lush Life: A Biography of Billy Strayhorn by David Hajdu, and Something to Live For: The Music of Billy Strayhorn by Walter van de Leur.
