Featured Biographies

Bassist Sam Suggs was recently named New Artist of the Month by Musical America, joined the Concert Artist Guild management roster as a soloist and New Music/New Places Fellow. and earned First Prize at the 2015 International Society of Bassists Solo Competition performing many of his own compositions. As a collaborative bassist, he has performed at Mostly Music, Chamber Music Northwest, Yellow Barn, Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center, his contemporary/jazz trio Triplepoint has toured in West Africa and Northern Europe, and his contemporary classical band Foundry was named a Laureate Winner in the Open Division of the inaugural M-Prize Competition.

Sam served as principal bass of the Oregon Bach Festival Berwick Academy for Historical Performance and earned honors in music theory and cognition from Northwestern University while working as the youngest principal bass of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago.

He recently received a commission from BMI to write a concerto for double bass, and his chamber music arrangements have been performed all over the country by New York's Chamber Music Society Lincoln Center, the Phoenix Chamber Music Society, Portland's Chamber Music Northwest, and Boston's Mistral Music.

Currently in his first year as Assistant Professor of Bass at James Madison University, Sam received the Dean's Prize and a Presser Foundation Award towards his doctoral studies at Yale University. Violinist Domenic Salerni is the recently-appointed first violinist of the Dalí Quartet. He moved up to Philadelphia from the Atlanta area, where he served on faculty as instructor and first violinist of Emory University's quartet-in-residence, the Vega String Quartet. He is on faculty at ArCoNet, and plays in Foundry.

Over the years, he has enjoyed performances at such venues as Vienna's Musikverien, Berlin's Auenkirche, the Flagler Museum in Palm Beach, FL, the Brevard Music Center, the Highlands-Cashiers Chamber Music Festival, the Tenri Institute, Concerts on the Slope, and Bryant Park.

As a clinician, Domenic has worked with the Atlanta Music Project, the Franklin Pond Chamber Music Festival, and ArcoNet Bootcamp. He has given master classes at Kennesaw State University, Augusta State University, and the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival.

He holds degrees from the Cleveland Institute of Music and Yale University's School of Music, where he studied with Linda Cerone, William Preucil, and Hyo Kang, respectively. He received Academic Honors from CIM and was a winner of the Yale Chamber Music Society Competition.

Domenic was featured in ArtsATL's "30 Under 30," was a semifinalist in the 2015 Schadt String Competition, was a laureate of the 2009 Sion-Valais International Violin Competition, and was a laureate of the first inaugural M Prize as a member of Foundry.
