Biographies

Saxophonist, clarinetist and ethnomusicologist Dr. Andrew Connell is an active performer of and an expert on Brazilian music, having performed and recorded with top Brazilian bossa nova and choro artists as well as with mandolinist Mike Marshall.

Chuck Dotas is professor of music and coordinator of jazz studies at James Madison University where he directs the JMU Jazz Ensemble. Dotas holds a B.M. from the University of Wisconsin at Green Bay, an M.M. from the Eastman School of Music and a D.A. from the University of Northern Colorado. He is well known as a composer and arranger, and his music is published through UNC Jazz Press, Walrus Music and Margun Music.

Bob Hallahan has appeared as a featured solo pianist at the Kennedy Center, and as a sideman with many notable jazz artists including saxophonists Joe Henderson and James Moody, trumpeters Clark Terry and Freddie Hubbard, and singers Sheila Jordan, Anita O'Day and René Marie. He can be heard on more than two dozen recordings as both a sideman and leader.

Guitarist Adam Larrabee is a seasoned jazz guitarist who appeared as a sideman on Bruce Hornsby's recording, *Spirit Trail*. He taught at New England Conservatory and performed in the Boston area for nearly 10 years, and is perhaps best known around the country as a banjoist with the bluegrass band, Love Canon.

Saxophonist David Pope has performed at the Kennedy Center and the International Saxophone Symposium in St. Andrews, Scotland. He is a highly regarded authority on multi-phonic technique and pedagogy. Pope is known nationally for his columns on creativity and improvisation (Saxophone Journal, Saxophone Today), and his blog, "Practice Monster."

Steve Layman plays trumpet, trombone and tuba in a variety of concert and jazz settings in the Central Virginia area. He was a middle and high school band teacher with Albemarle County Public Schools from 1977 to 2008. Layman directed the University of Virginia Symphonic Band and Brass Ensemble from 1985 until 1990, has taught theory and applied brass at Piedmont Virginia Community College since 2005, and has directed the Charlottesville Municipal Band since 2008.

Mayor Deanna Reed, a Harrisonburg native, currently serves as the program director for On the Road Collaborative, a nonprofit youth empowerment organization for 100 youth at Skyline Middle School in Harrisonburg. On November 8, 2016, Reed was elected to Harrisonburg City Council with the highest number of votes ever for a Harrisonburg City Council race. On January 3, 2017, Reed was elected by City Council as the first African-American female mayor of Harrisonburg, Virginia.

Edward L. Weiner is the immediate past president of the Virginia State Bar. Jazz4JusticeTM was Ed's brainchild 16 years ago at George Mason University. It has received national and state awards of recognition. Ed is very pleased to have J4J make its seventh appearance on the stage of the Forbes Center.
