Kevin McMillan has a performing career that has spanned over 25 years, with more than 750 concerts, 15 professional recordings, a Grammy Award, a Gramophone Award and numerous Juno Award nominations. He has made appearances with virtually every major North American orchestra and has also established a presence in Europe. Timothy W. Sparks enjoys a versatile performing career that includes opera, oratorio, and concert work, with appearances in Europe and throughout the U.S. His 2011 recording of the Arnold Schönberg chamber version of Mahler's *Das Lied von der Erde* was released by Centaur Records. Sparks serves as a lecturer in voice and diction at UNC-Chapel Hill and is an active adjudicator.

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Program Notes

Concerto for Marimba and Strings by French composer Emmanuel Séjourné was commissioned for the 2006 International Marimba Competition in Linz, Austria. Since that time, it has become one of the most frequently performed marimba concertos due to its warm lyricism and the impressive virtuosity it requires of the soloist.

Michael Daugherty's Flute Concerto *Trail of Tears* was premiered in 2010 by the Omaha Symphony and flutist Amy Porter. The following excerpted commentary is by the composer.

"In America, the forced removal of all Native Americans living east of the Mississippi River began with the passage of President Andrew Jackson's Indian Removal Act of 1830. In 1838, 15,000 Cherokee men, women and children were forcibly taken from their homes by the U.S Army and placed in stockades and camps in Tennessee. From November 1838 to March 1839, the Cherokee, with scant clothing and many without shoes, were forced to make an 800-mile march for relocation in Oklahoma during the bitter cold of the winter. Suffering from exposure, disease and starvation, nearly 4,000 Cherokee died during the five-month march known as the "Trail of Tears."

"My flute concerto is a musical journey into how the human spirit discovers ways to deal with the upheaval, adversity and adapting to a new environment. The first movement reflects on meaningful memories of things past... The reflective second movement, entitled *incantation*, meditates on the passing of loved ones and the hope for a better life in the world beyond. The third and final movement, *sun dance*, evokes the most spectacular and important religious dance ceremony of the Plains Indians of the 19th-century North America."

In 1907, Gustav Mahler was given a volume of ancient Chinese poetry translated by Hans Bethge entitled *The Chinese Flute*. These poems of beauty and poignancy dealing with isolation and the transience of life and nature spoke to Mahler in a powerful way. He chose seven of these poems to set in his six-movement work (the last movement contains two) for large orchestra and two vocal soloists entitled *Das Lied von der Erde (The Song of the Earth)*. This work is a hybrid of the two forms Mahler spent his compositional life immersed in, song and symphony.

The version heard today is an arrangement of the work for chamber orchestra begun by Mahler devotee and innovative composer Arnold Schoenberg. While he set out notes concerning his plan for the arrangement, he was never able to finish it himself. Using Schoenberg's notes, Rainer Riehn completed the arrangement in 1983.

Biographies 2018 JMU Concerto/Aria Competition Winners

JMU master's student **Jordan Frazier** made her debut as a soloist with the Bryan Symphony Orchestra in 2015 as a winner of the Joan Derryberry Memorial Concerto Competition at her alma mater, Tennessee Technological University. Frazier recently won a competitive audition for a position as a flutist and piccoloist with the U.S. Naval Fleet Bands, which will begin upon her May graduation. Percussionist and composer **Caleb Pickering** is currently an adjunct professor at Southern Virginia University and a D.M.A. candidate at JMU. He has performed extensively in the Dallas and Las Vegas areas. His original works are regularly performed by universities and ensembles nationwide, and have been commissioned and premiered internationally.
