## Biography

Mezzo-soprano, Carrie Stevens is highly regarded for her versatility in concert, chamber and operatic venues, spanning styles from Baroque to Contemporary music. She has performed with conductors Jeffrey Kahane, Ivan Fischer, Helmuth Rilling, Roger Norrington, Michael Morgan, Eiji Oue, and Carl St. Clair, among others. Her solo concert experience includes performances with the Oakland Symphony, Santa Rosa Symphony, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra in performances of a large number of the major oratorios. She has appeared in solo and chamber recitals at the Kennedy Center and in performances of the Messiah and the Bach St. John Passion at the National Cathedral. Music festival appearances include the Richmond Chamber, Staunton Music Festival, Stony-Brook Bach Festival, Crested Butte, Kalamazoo Bach, Austin Bach Society, and Oregon Bach Festivals. Opera roles include the Mother in Amahl and the Night Visitors (Giancarlo Menotti) Xerxes in Xerxes by (G.F. Handel) Ma Moss in the Tender Land by Aaron Copland, and as Elmire in the East Coast Premiere of Tartuffe (Kirke Mechem.)

Dr. Stevens has a particular interest in contemporary music and has been involved in many premieres including works by Kirke Mechem, Ofer Ben-Amots, John Baboukis, John Hilliard, Jason Haney and many others. Professor of Voice at James Madison University since 2001, she holds a Doctorate of Music from the University of Minnesota, a Master of Music from Boston University and a Bachelor of Music from the University of Wisconsin–Madison.
