She has appeared at venues such as the Kennedy Center Terrace Theater, Weill Recital Hall, Strathmore Music Center (MD), Coolidge Auditorium at the Library of Congress, Smithsonian Chamber Music Series, Lensic Performing Arts Center (Santa Fe), Caramoor Performers' Showcase, Le Domaine Forget (Canada), and National Concert Hall (Taipei, Taiwan). Takao has distinguished herself as a musician of great versatility. While known for her affinity to works by Beethoven, Chopin, and Rachmaninov among the traditional repertoire, she is equally sought after as an enthusiastic advocate of newly composed music. She can also be heard on other CDs and DVDs available from Dorian Recordings, Capstone Records, Centaur, and Friends of Smithsonian. Combining her unique performance background with research, Takao directs the graduate program in Keyboard Performance and Pedagogy as Associate Professor at the Frost School of Music, University of Miami.

A prizewinner of numerous

Serenity Trio was formed in 2017 by JMU faculty members Beth Chandler, Diane Phoenix-Neal and Jaclyn Wappel to explore, enjoy and perform music written for their unique combination of instruments. The new and colorful instrumental grouping was first explored just over 100 years ago by French composer Claude Debussy, who composed his Sonata for flute, viola and harp in 1915.

Flutist **Beth Chandler** enjoys an active career as a soloist, chamber musician, orchestral player, and teacher. A frequent guest artist and master class clinician, Chandler has performed and presented at major venues, festivals, and universities throughout the United States and abroad. She was a Fulbright Scholar and is a past president of the National Flute Association. She holds degrees from University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, New England Conservatory, and Baylor University. Chandler is professor of flute and a recent recipient of the College of Visual and Performing Arts Distinguished Teacher Award and is a professor of flute at James Madison University.

Biographies

Diane Phoenix-Neal performs nationally and internationally as a collaborative chamber musician and as a soloist. She also enjoys her roles as a clinician and educator nationwide. In France, she served as both the principal solo violist of l'Orchestre de Picardie and as violist of Quatuor Joachim, finalists at the 1992 Banff International String Quartet competition. Dr. Phoenix-Neal received her training from North Carolina's UNC School of the Arts, the Juilliard School and holds a doctorate from UNC Greensboro. She holds the positions of assistant professor of viola at James Madison University since 2016 and principal violist and soloist with the Shenandoah Valley Bach Festival since 2003.

Jaclyn Wappel is a versatile performer, instructor and scholar whose accolades include First Prize in the Midwest Solo Harp Competition, a performance of Mozart's Concerto for flute and harp in Italy, and a Carnegie Hall performance with Purdue University. Wappel served as adjunct professor at Earlham College and most recently served as instructor/ensemble director for Harp Services Ltd. in Hong Kong. She received her D.A. degree from Ball State University in 2016 and currently teaches at James Madison University and Southern Virginia University.
